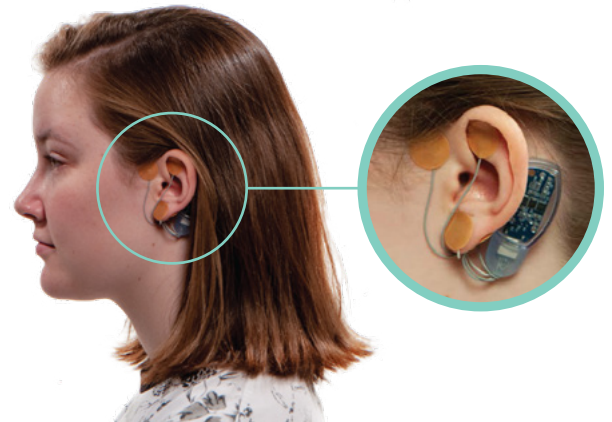


Kids should be doing kid-things, not suffering from IBS pain.

What is IB-Stim?

IB-Stim, by NeurAxis' proprietary percutaneous electrical nerve field stimulator (PENFS) system, is the first FDA-cleared, drug-free method for treating functional abdominal pain associated with IBS in patients 11-18 years of age with minimal side effects. Serious side effects are extremely rare and have not been reported when using IB-Stim.



How does IB-Stim work?

A trained health care professional places the IB-Stim generator behind the patient's ear and attaches four thin, insulated wires with tiny sterile needles on the ear. IB-Stim sends gentle electrical impulses into cranial nerve bundles located beneath the skin in the ear, which then modulates some brain areas that control pain (e.g., amygdala) along with the vagus nerve.

What can patients do while wearing an IB-Stim device?

Most patients are able to go to school and participate in extracurricular activities while wearing the device, including exercise and playing noncontact sports. Water activities should be avoided, but patients can shower with the device covered.

Will my insurance cover IB-Stim?

The level of coverage and rules for coverage of the IB-Stim device will depend on your specific insurance policy. The IB-Stim Guidance and Patient Support (GPS) team can help you and your health care provider understand your insurance coverage and financial assistance options. If you have questions regarding insurance or coverage for IB-Stim, work with your health care provider.
